# The Battle of Shiloh

The Battle of Shiloh, also known as the Battle of Pittsburg Landing, was a major battle in the Western Theater of the American Civil War, fought on April 6 and April 7, 1862, in southwestern Tennessee.



Confederate forces under Generals Albert Sidney Johnston and P.G.T. Beauregard launched a surprise attack against the Union Army of Maj. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant

Gen. Ulvsses Grant and came very close to defeating his army.

the first day of battle. the On Confederates struck with the intention of driving the Union defenders away from the Tennessee River and into the swamps of Owl Creek to the west, hoping to defeat Grant's Army of the Tennessee before it could link up with Maj. Gen. Don Carlos Buell's Army of the Ohio. Some Federals made determined stands and by afternoon, they had established a battle line at the sunken road, known as the "Hornets Nest." Repeated Rebel attacks failed to carry the Hornets Nest, but massed artillery helped to turn the tide as Confederates surrounded

the Union troops and captured, killed, or wounded most. Johnston had been mortally wounded earlier and, second in command, Gen. P. G. T. Beauregard,

took over. The Union troops established another line covering Pittsburg Landing, anchored with artillery and augmented by

Buell's men who began to arrive and take up positions. Fighting continued until after dark, but the Federals held. By the next morning, the combined Federal forces numbered about 40,000, outnumbering



Beauregard's army of than 30,000. less Beauregard was unaware of the arrival of Buell's army and launched a counter-attack in response to a twomile

William Nelson's division of Buell's army at 6:00 am, which was, at first, successful. Union troops stiffened and began forcing the Confederates back. Beauregard ordered a counterattack, which stopped the Union advance but did not break its battle line. At this point, Beauregard realized that he could not win and, having suffered too many casualties, he retired from the field and headed back to Corinth. On the 8th. Grant sent Brig. Gen. William T. Sherman, with two brigades, and Brig. Gen. Thomas J. Wood, with his division, in pursuit of Beauregard. They ran into the Rebel rearguard, commanded by Col. Nathan Bedford Forrest, at Fallen Timbers. Forrest's aggressive tactics, although eventually contained, influenced the Union troops to return to Pittsburg Landing. Grant's mastery of the Confederate forces continued: he had beaten them once again. The Confederates continued to fall back until launching their mid-August offensive.

# CAMP COMMANDER'S MESSAGE

Fort Donelson Camp # 62 is off to a very good start for 2009.

A planning meeting on 10 Jan. included electing officers for the year. The officers are: Sam C. Gant, CC; Trent Johnson, SVC; David DuBrucq, JVC and 1<sup>st</sup>Sgt, SVR; Scott Holmes, Secr'y/ Treasurer; George A. Huttick, Historian, Signals Officer, and Graves Registry Officer; and David Eagan, Chaplain.

The Camp will continue to honor our Civil War ancestors through registering them in the SUVCW Graves Registry but extend this to searching out Union veterans' graves in Middle Tennessee. We will place G.A.R. flag holders on the graves as funds are available. We wish to cooperate with SCV camps in this search. We particularly want to place flag holders for FDC62 members' ancestors. Flag Day ceremonies, 13 June, are planned at the graves of Capt. William Rickman, 5<sup>th</sup>TN Cav US and Pvt. Gabriel Capley, 10<sup>th</sup>TN Inf US.

FDC62 hosted the Annual Encampment of the Dept. of Tennessee-Alabama at historic Ferguson Hall, Spring Hill, the site of CS Gen, Earl Van Dorn's murder. At the Encampment, CC Sam Gant was elected Dept. SVC and George Huttick was appointed Dept. Patriotic Instructor. The dinner was delightful and the presentation of the story of Ferguson Hall by the persona of the 1863 owner, Martin Cheairs (aka Bill Alsup) was fascinating.

1<sup>st</sup> Sgt. David DuBrucq's 10<sup>th</sup>TN Inf US SVR regiment finally received SUVCW National's recognition. Many of the men have purchased their uniforms and are ready to march on Fort Donelson 11 April for the meeting, dinner and tour. The 10<sup>th</sup> TN US will also be the color guard for the Flag Day ceremonies and for other mid-Tennessee events during the year.

We welcome Scott Holmes, Mike Boley, Mike Plumley, and Larry Cockerham to FDC62. The Camp now has 33 members, approximately one-third the total membership of the Dept. of Tennessee.Two other men have consented to be associates of FDC62: Thomas Flagel, PCC, a CSCC professor and the author of several history books, and Joe Smyth, a member of Haskell-Marston Camp in Maine and active in several local historical groups.

Great-Grandfather of Brother Mike Plumley John W. Plumley, Pvt., Co. B, 122<sup>nd</sup> OH Vol Inf; Enlisted: 28 May 1864; Discharged: 26 June. 1865. b: 2 Oct. 1844, d: 6 Oct. 1926, buried: Convoy, Ohio.

Plumley was taken prisoner at the battle of Monocacy by General Early's forces, at the time of their raid toward Washington. He was imprisoned at Lynchburg, then at Danville, and finally at Libby Prison—in all about nine months. He came out of the army in very poor health, having suffered hardships and privations, from which he never fully recovered.

LaRue enlisted at Camp Mansfield, OH on 14 Oct 1862, Co. H, 120th Reg't, Ohio Vol Inf. On 27 Nov 1864, he transferred to Co. K, 114<sup>th</sup> OH Inf. On 24 July 1865, he transferred to Co. E, 48<sup>th</sup> OH Inf. He mustered out 14 Oct 1865 and was on detached duty for one year afterwards.

Brother David DuBrucq was elected to be the unit's first commander and has been appointed to the rank of 1<sup>st</sup> Sgt by Maj. Ken Early, commander of the 7<sup>th</sup> Military District, SVR. The Sons of Veterans Reserve (SVR) is the ceremonial uniformed military component of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. The SVR's roots date back to 1881 with the "Cadet Corps" of the Grand Army of the Republic. In 1962, the National Military Department was created by the SUVCW and consolidated the SVR units under national regulations and command.
