

SUVCW FORT DONELSON CAMP No. 62 Volume 15 Issue No. 4 Unknown Soldier May Draw Crowds

When the bones of a Civil War soldier were found at a construction site on Columbia Avenue back in May, the discovery brought out small groups of onlookers, archaeologists and news crews.

But the soldier's reburial in October will likely be a different story. Thousands of visitors, including groups of Civil War reenactors from throughout the U.S., are expected to participate in the soldier's reburial on Oct. 10.

Franklin aldermen gave their clearance to re-inter the skeleton in Franklin's Rest Haven cemetery as part of a full military ceremony that will include a horse-drawn



caisson through downtown Franklin. "Certainly we will have hundreds if not thousands of reenactors here in Franklin," said Robin Hood, member of the city's Battlefield Task Force. "I think it's going to be a significant event for all of Franklin and all of Tennessee."

Workers accidentally unearthed the soldier's lone, unmarked grave while digging a trench at the Through the Green development on Columbia Avenue. Along with the skeleton, archaeologists also found brass buttons with a Union insignia, tacks from his boots and a bullet as part of the excavation. The discovery of the soldier's remains gives Civil War buffs a rare chance to honor the dead killed in a war fought more than a century ago. "It's a oncein-a-lifetime opportunity," said J.T. Thompson, task force member and Lotz House owner. "It's a very unique, wonderful opportunity to participate in history." It is not known exactly when the man died, but officials speculate that it occurred in late 1864, sometime around the Battle of Franklin.

Since being unearthed, the bones have been kept by the state Department of Environment and Conservation until city staff and Civil War historians could work out plans for the reburial. In the interim, Hood and other task force members say they've fielded numerous calls and e-mails from Civil War groups and others throughout the country interested in the discovery and coming to Franklin to participate in the reburial.

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"I think the long-range return for our investment in this event is immeasurable." "It will be a catalyst for future Hood said. events and for future recognition of Franklin as a historic tourism destination." No cost estimates for the funeral accompanied information to city aldermen.

According to the task force's plans, the soldier's body will lie in state at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, beginning Oct. 8 and remain there through the morning of Oct. 10. The church was a Union barracks during the Battle of Franklin. After a ceremony in the church that morning, Union and Confederate re-enactors will accompany the horse-drawn caisson to Rest Haven cemetery. Streets along the route would be closed for the ceremonv.

The task force is asking that three stages or scaffolding be erected along the funeral route for media and camera crews to be able to better photograph the event. At the cemetery, the tomb will be marked with discarded Civil War-era limestone columns formerly used in the old state Capitol building in Nashville. Hood said. He said there will be no cost to create the monument.

We took the initiative to promote reburying the soldier in a historic cemetery, and the City of Franklin and the Mayor's Battlefield Task Force got solidly behind it. SUVCW Fort Donelson Camp # 62 and SCV Sam Davis Camp are serving as hosts for the occasion. The 10th TN Inf (US) SVR is the lead unit with local reenactors filling the ranks. We encourage other brothers in the Camp to join the SVR, put on a uniform to be a part of this historic event, and wear the Union blue for other patriotic occasions.

Private Elbert Bacon, Co. E 6th Tennessee Volunteer Infantry Enlisted: 10 April 1862; Discharged: 30 June 1865 Buried: Upper Spring Creek Cem. McMinn County, Tennessee



6th Tennessee Volunteer Infantry

Organized at Williamsburg and Boston, KY, for 3-year enlistment. The 6th TN saw action at Missionary Ridge and duty at Knoxville. They took part in the Assault on Kennesaw and Siege of Atlanta. They initially pursued Hood into Alabama and then were in the Nashville Campaign, Nov-Dec 1864 – the battles of Spring Hill, Franklin, Nashville and the Pursuit of Hood to the Tennessee River.

Co. G, 13th Connecticut Infantry Volunteers b: 28 Nov 1843; d: 6 Sept 1914; Died at Enfield, Hartford County, Connecticut

13th Connecticut Infantry Volunteers

Organized at New Haven, CT, 7 Jan. 1862. Occupation of New Orleans, LA; Operations against Port Hudson; Red River Campaign; Sheridan's Shenandoah Valley Campaign – Battles of Winchester, Fisher's Hill and Cedar Creek. Duties at Savannah and Athens, GA.

The SUVCW brothers of Camp 62 who wear the uniforms of Union blue will have a unique and indeed rare opportunity to help make history. The funeral of the Unknown Civil War Soldier from the Franklin Battlefield is a historic event of national interest in which the Fort Donelson Camp # 62 and the 10th Tennessee Infantry (US) SVR are playing a significant role.

The color guard will be leading the procession with Roger Tenney, 10th TN Inf (US) SVR, carrying the 35-star American flag. Bill Heard, will represent the 10th TN Inf (US) SVR in the honor guard. 1st Sgt. David Du Brucq, 10th TN Inf (US) SVR, will command the first unit in the procession, and then at Rest Haven Cemetery he will command the flag ceremony with Sam Gant and Larry Cockerham receiving the folded flags. Sam Gant and Larry Cockerham will conduct the "Dust-to-Dust" ceremony as the soldiers cast soil into the Unknown Soldier's grave from each state which took part in the Battle of Franklin.

If other members of FDC62 wish to take part in this historic event, there is still time to get your uniforms and march with the SVR.
