

SUVCW FORT DONELSON CAMP No. 62 Volume 16 Issue No. 1 Winter 2010 The Army of the Cumberland

During the Civil War, Union forces in Tennessee were part of several different federal armies, primarily the Army of the Cumberland, the Army of the Ohio, and the Army of the Tennessee. An army from the early Department of the Missouri under the command of General U. S. Grant captured Forts Henry and Donelson in February 1862. By the time of the battle of Shiloh that April, however, most of this force under Grant's command was known as the Army of the Tennessee.


The Army of the Ohio, once part of the Department of the Ohio under the command of General Don Carlos Buell, also participated at Shiloh. From this force, after the battle of

Perryville, Kentucky, in the fall of 1862, would emerge the Army of the Cumberland. In late October, command of the army was taken away from Buell and given to



General William S. Rosecrans. Upon his arrival in Nashville in November 1862, Rosecrans brought news that the Union forces gathered there would now be known as the Army of the Cumberland.

From November 1862 to November 1863, the Army of the Cumberland would be the primary Union force in the state, participating in the battles of Stones River and Chattanooga in Tennessee and the battle of Chickamauga in Georgia and conducting the brilliant Tullahoma Campaign of 1863. After the loss at Chickamauga in September 1863, however, command of the Army of the Cumberland passed from Rosecrans to Major General George H. Thomas, whose nickname was the "Rock of Chickamauga." Thomas's army joined forces with the Army of the Tennessee, led by William T. Sherman, during the Chattanooga battles of November 1863, a successful campaign under the overall leadership of Grant. Thomas's forces also fought in the Atlanta campaign of 1864 as part of Sherman's massive invasion force.




When Confederate Gen. John Bell Hood launched his Tennessee invasion in the fall of 1864 Sherman detached his corps from the old Army of the Cumberland and

from the Army of the Tennessee to buttress Thomas's army in Nashville. These forces successfully defended the Union occupation of Nashville at the battles of Spring Hill, Franklin, and Nashville in late 1864. Thomas, whose reputation as a field commander is indelibly linked with the name of the Army of the Cumberland, led the final devastating Union assault at Nashville, an attack which all but destroyed the Confederate Army of Tenn.

The Union armies in Tennessee were known for their several excellent generals, especially Grant, Sherman, Thomas, McClernand, Sheridan, and Charles F. Smith, who not only played a significant role in Tennessee but in Georgia, Mississippi, and Virginia and in other U.S. military campaigns after the war.

The burial of Franklin's Unknown Soldier served as a defining moment for the Camp and the 10th TN SVR. It was then that recognition came from SUVCW national, from national Civil War publications, and, more importantly, from local and regional Civil War enthusiasts.

Now, in 2010, the Camp needs to capitalize on this recognition to carry out the goal of the SUVCW by doing our part to preserve the memory of our ancestors who fought to preserve the Union.

In order to carry out effectively the SUVCW goal, the Camp must gain visibility in communities throughout the mid-state area. Presently, a little more than half of the Camp's in-state members live in Williamson or Davidson Counties. This, of course, means that the Camp must reach out for members, especially, in communities with lower membership, and then encourage these members to become active in local organizations and events while making known their membership in the SUVCW. Preservation organizations, historical associations, patriotic societies and Civil War roundtables are excellent groups in which to promote the SUVCW. The Camp and the 10th TN SVR can help gain visibility by holding flag services for CW veterans in a community and following up with local newspaper submissions.

A long-term goal of FDC must be to promote the establishment of new camps within the Middle Tennessee area now being served by this single camp. If and when we move to have these camps formed, they must be established on the basis of commitment and involvement of the potential charter members of the new camp.

In looking forward to 100% membership renewal, and each brother working to recruit another member, I am confident that 2010 will be an even better year for the Camp than was the past year.

It has been a very good inaugural year for the 10th Regiment, Tennessee U.S. Volunteer Infantry. The 10th received its national charter in February 2009, and in our first year we have made tremendous progress. Our unit has grown by 33% having added three new members.

The 10th Tennessee participated in the first ceremony honoring veterans of the U.S.C.I. sponsored by Fort Donelson Camp 62 in Franklin, TN, On Flag Day, 2009, and as an individual unit in a ceremony for a 10th Regiment Civil War veteran at Primm Springs, TN. The 10th took a leading Federal role at the re-interment of the Battle of Franklin Unknown Soldier, an event that gained national attention and was attended by Brig. Gen. As we mature into a veteran unit we hope to expand our activities in Middle Tennessee, increase our uniformed membership and participate in a wider range of 2010 events.
