A Memorial held on February 20th, 2016, to commemorate 154th anniversary of the Army of the Tennessee's victory at Fort Donelson. Members of the 10th Tennessee Infantry, SVR, representing both Fort Donelson Camp 62 and Army of the Tennesee Camp 64 Participated in the ceremony.

During this year's anniversary ceremony, the names of all Union soldiers killed at the Battle of Fort Donelson and buried at the Fort Donelson National Cemetery were read along with the regiment they fought with. Superintendent Brian McCutchen and Ranger Susan Hawkins represented the National Park Service for the Memorial Ceremonies. Fort Donelson was the first of many significant victories for both General Grant and the union Army of the Tennessee.

On December 5th, 2015, the 10th Regiment, Tennessee U.S. Vols participated in the commemoration of the last Civil War engagements in Tennessee. General James Wilson's cavalry was pursuing the remnants of General Hood's CS Army of Tennessee in far southern Middle Tennessee after the Battle of Nashville.

The first of these engagements was at Anthony Hill on Christmas Day, 1864, where Wilson's Cavalry encountered CS General Nathan Bedford Forrest's Cavalry, entrenched on Anthony Hill. Wilson, believing Hoods Army was easy prey attacked the position and was repulsed by Forrest's Cavalry.

The 26th of December, 1864, opened with a heavy fog and gently falling rain which slowed Wislon's Cavalry and made locating the enemy difficult. Despite early confusion and heavy fire from the enemy, by afternoon Wilson's troopers had prevailed driving the Confederates before them. Once driven from their works, the Confederates were pursued for a time but the Union troopers soon went into winter quarters, having swept away the presence of any Confederate army in Tennessee.

Three Union Soldiers, buried nearby, were honored during the Commemoration. Private Morgan Russell, Co. D 2nd East Tenn Cavalry (US) who was killed on December 26th, 1864 at Sugar Creek. Private William Hoskins, Co. A 4th Tenn Cavalry (US) also Killed on December 26, 1864 at Sugar Creek. Private Oliver Banner, Co. B 4th Tenn Cavalry (US) who was killed on Christmas Day, 1864 at Anthony Hill.

Regulations ...

FROM CASEY'S INFANTRY TACTICS

Article II. INSTRUCTION OF OFFICERS.

- 60. The instruction of officers can be perfected only by joining theory to practice. The colonel will often practise them in marching and in estimating distances, and he will carefully endeavor to cause them to take steps equal in length and swiftness. They will also be exercised in the double quick step.
- 61. The instruction of officers will include all the Titles in this system of drill, as well as a perfect knowledge of the system of firing as proscribed by the War Department.
- 62. Every officer will make himself perfectly acquainted with the bugle signals; and should, by practice, be enabled, if necessary, to sound them. This knowledge, so necessary in general instruction, becomes of vital importance on actual service in the field.

INSTRUCTION OF SERGEANTS.

- 63. As the discipline and efficiency of a company materially depend on the conduct and character of its sergeants, they should be selected with care, and properly instructed in all the duties appertaining to their rank.
- 64. Their theoretical instruction should include the School of the Soldier, the School of the Company, and the Drill for Skirmishers; as also a knowledge of the principles of firing. They should likewise be well instructed in their duties as battalion guides.
- 65. The captain selects from the corporals in his company, those whom he judges fit to be admitted to the theoretical instruction of the sergeants.

INSTRUCTION OF CORPORALS.

- 66. Their theoretical instruction should include the School of the Soldier, with a knowledge of firing.
- 67. The captain selects from his company a few privates, who may be admitted to the theoretical instruction of the corporals.
- 68. As the instruction of sergeants and corporals, is intended principally to qualify them for the instruction of the privates, they should be taught not only to execute, but to explain intelligibly every thing they may be required to teach.

REGULATIONS OF THE SONS OF VETERANS RESERVE 2011

INTRODUCTION

The Sons of Veterans Reserve is organized and regulated in accordance with Chapter IV of the National Regulations of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW). That SUVCW Regulation is as follows:

Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War National Regulations

2001

Chapter IV Sons of Veterans Reserve

Organization and Structure

<u>Section 1.</u> The Sons of Veterans Reserve (SVR) shall constitute the authorized military component of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW). It shall include all military bodies of the Order (SUVCW) with the exception that Camps and Departments may maintain an independent military organization as a Camp Guard or Department Guard for parades, services and ceremonies under the auspices of the Camp or Department with which the unit is associated. The highest military rank attainable within any Camp or Department Guard shall be that of Captain. At all functions where Camp Guard units, Department Guard units and SVR units are participating, the highest ranking SVR commissioned or noncommissioned officer shall have command of all military bodies of the SUVCW, regardless of the rank of an officer in a Camp Guard or Department Guard.

Section 2. To be eligible for and in order to maintain membership in the SVR, a Brother shall be a member or Associate in good standing in the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.



Civil War Factoids Naval Service Edition

- U.S Grant used the New Uncle Sam in his expedition against Fort Donelson. Despite its role in that significant victory, the 902 ton side-wheeler was renamed the USS Black Hawk in December of 1862.
- Ten Union vessels of varying size and strength were called the Atlantic
- A distant relative of the Reindeer was commemorated when the 162 ton Countess became the USS Elk while the steamer Rachel Miller Was renamed the USS Reindeer!
- The Confederate privateer named for the governor of North Carolina, A. D. Vance, soon became the USS Frolic after it was captured by the U.S. Navy.
- U.S. Secretary of the Navy, Gideon Wells must have had a penchant for blossoms. One after another, the names of several vessels were name in favor of flowers. Some of the vessels were renamed as follows:
 - The Maggie Baker became the USS Heliotrope
 - The Vicksburg became the USS Acacia
 - The John Dix became the USS Geranium
 - The Martha became the USS Violet
 - The Republic became the USS Peony
- When the U.S. Navy acquired the bark Abd-el-Kadir, it's small wonder that the name was changed immediately. Unfortunately, records failed to indicate why the new Federal vessel was renamed the USS Ammonoosuc.
